1915- The Boy Scouts of America organized a Farmington troop. Bishop Clark has been an ardent and constant supporter of this program.

1915- Utah State Capitol Building completed.

1925- Bishop Clark called to the Central States for a short term mission.

1945- April, A. L. Clark made president of the Davis County Bank, the position he holds.

1960- A. L. Clark presented a new bicycle on the occasion of his 95th birthday. This he finds a convenience despite the fact that today is the Space Age.

1965- The Great Salt Lake Council of the Boy Scouts of America awarded A. L. Clark and Appreciation Award for ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF LIFE and SERVICE TO BOYHOOD AND FELLOWMAN.

1968- His extraordinary life of service to his fellowmen came to a close on May 25, twelve days before his 103rd Birthday.
