G: What have you done since your retirement then?

G: You can be proud of your family.

C: About as soon as we got settled there, they called us into the temple as temple workers in the Salt Lake Temple. We were there for practically nine years. Two and a half years I was a sealer in the Salt lake Temple. I had a sick spell. It was just too much for me. After they released me, they called us on a mission down to Florida so we went down there for six months. That was in 1972 and 1973 I guess. Other than that we just go to the temple. Up until lately we've been going twice a week. We've cut down now to one time a week. Age is catching up to us.

C: We are. Everyone of our children that have been married have married in the temple. Everyone of our grandchildren of the boys that are old enough have been on missions. This girl that you saw the picture of when you came in has been on a year and a half mission. So we think that we have a pretty good family that way.

C: I met this girl when I was in high school. We went together and just off and on for several years. While I was going to college, she took a nursing course and she was a nurse. When I got through high school and after I stayed out a year from school, I decided to get married. She and I were ready. So we got married and a year later we had a child, a girl, come to our home.
