5--SWEET LOVE REMEMBERED by Helen Cortez Stafford, and Valiant Hearts by Julia Rich Cole, for the insight into life in Bear River Valley, where descendants of Laura Clark Phelps (Ezra T.'s sister) lived, in particular the Charles C. Rich family.

6--Account of the accident at Mill Creek written by W.O. Robinson in a letter to his sister, May R. (Mary Elizabeth Robinson) Porter

7--Diaries and private memoirs of Mary E.R. Porter.

8--Letter from Bryant A. Robinson as quoted in text.

9--Voluntary information by Amasa Lyman and wife, Susan Duncan Clark during conversations with the author; also from May R. Porter and Albert C. Robinson.

10--Telephone conversations with Mrs. (Aunt) Laura C. (Silver) Cook and her daughter, Mrs. LaRue C. Bowen, and expert in pioneer lore, particularly of the Clark Family. These conversations provided the impetus and vision which improved the original manuscript very much.
